***OBSTACLES TO CHRISTIAN GROWTH***

Luke 8:1-15

I. Introduction: (1-3)

II. The Parable Told (4-8)

- A. Seed fell on the path and is trampled - birds ate it.
- B. Seed fall on rock and withers due to no moisture.
- C. Seed fell among the thorns – and were choked out.
- D. Seed feel upon good soil – yielded a crop.

*“He who has ears to hear, let him hear”*

III. The Parable Explained. (9-15)

- A. Seed = the Word of God.
- B. Path = those who hear but the devil comes along and takes away the Word so they do not believe and they are not saved.
- C. Rock = those who hear the Word and receive it with joy. Yet there is no root and when they are tested, they fall away and are not saved.
- D. Among thorns = those who hear and believe and begin to grow. Yet the worries, riches, and pleasures keep them from maturing.
- E. Among good soil = those who hear the word, retain it, and by persevering produce a crop.
